This included putting together a committee to plan the celebration of our 50th anniversary, a milestone that was unimaginable during our humble beginnings, but one we look forward to celebrating with pride and admiration in 2021.

Three days after coming to Canada as a refugee from Uganda. Shamira came to the Kennedy House Youth Shelter. Since her arrival, she has shown us what it means to embody perseverance and hope and has made incredible strides in building a life here in Canada. First, she secured a job as a Customer Service Representative and then was granted status as a Protected Person. But she didn't stop there. Shamira worked with Kennedy House to secure housing funds and moved into permanent housing within 5 months. Now, Shamira works on the front lines providing employment support using her professional background in social services and she remains connected with the shelter as a peer navigator and role model for

For the two years that Leah* lived at our Kennedy Road home, working towards postsecondary was always her main goal so staff did everything they could to help her achieve that. After enrolling in an alternative school program, she transitioned into mainstream school and excelled in all her subjects with the help of Kennedy House and the school. And hard work pays off. Leah was accepted into the Early Childhood Education program at Centennial College! She utilized all the trainings that were available to her so that she could prepare herself for independence, like how to grocery shop on a budget, make nutritious meals and access healthcare on her own. Kennedy House became Leah's family, so she keeps in touch and visits whenever she can. We're happy to share that she's still living in a safe environment and is doing incredibly well in school!




