Working together, our Board, staff, donors, community partners and other stakeholders help to put young people on the path to a successful future. We provide the tools that youth need to make incredible changes in their own lives – and from there, anything is possible.

On behalf of our Board Chair, Christopher Carew, and myself, I would like to thank all of our donors for giving so generously to support our children and youth in the past fiscal year. You have allowed us to respond to the needs of our community by growing and strengthening our programs in amazing ways. One of the goals of last year's strategic planning process was to enhance the quality of our services, and this is an area where we've focused strongly in recent months.

We've considered fresh new opportunities to strengthen our core services, while also solidifying the support we are currently offering to youth. For example, there was a high need for shelter beds during the winter months due to the extreme cold weather. We responded to this urgency by adding more beds at the Kennedy House Youth Shelter in an effort to support the City of Toronto and homeless youth. We hope to have additional opportunities to support the city in the future as everyone works collectively to manage this challenging issue.

Our Developmental Services Programs have the capacity and interest to respond to an increased need for additional services, such as respite care and day programming. To support us in this endeavour and to strengthen our current DS Programs, we have brought on a new consultant with close to 40 years of experience in the field. With this support and guidance, we feel we'll be prepared to expand and strengthen our D-STAY Program and further build on the residential component we offer to young people who are

DSO-eligible. We will continue to enhance the skills of our staff through coaching, training and mentoring that will bring valuable new insights.

Together with our front line staff, management and supporters, we are well on our way to securing our position as a leading youth agency in the Greater Toronto Area.

Success in our community . . .

The LIFE program at the **Kennedy House Youth Shelter** helped young people
experiencing homelessness to build
employment skills. Says one participant:
"I now feel confident to go out and
look for a job."

Two students in **Day Treatment** prepared to become full-time students in a mainstream school setting, and another former student graduated from college as a registered massage therapist.

A young person at **Kennedy House Youth Centre**, our youth detention facility, was able to complete high school credits as well as take a college course while in our care. After being released, this youth was accepted into a business program at a local college.



A new location of our **Kennedy House After School Program** opened on Glamorgan Avenue in Scarborough, allowing even more children to participate in fun, educational activities and make friends after school.

In August 2017, we held our **annual community BBQ** free of charge for community members in Scarborough, complete with food, games and a bouncy castle for the kids. It was a great way to support our neighbours!

Kennedy House donors stepped up *big time* to support the youth in our programs by giving generously through our **Change for Change** initiative in seven TTC subway stations, our **Matching Campaign** sponsored by Toyota on the Park, as well as our **Coldest Night of the Year** event, which drew a large crowd to the Guildwood neighbourhood of Scarborough.

From bored after school to learning is cool Loretta's Story

Loretta is a single mom to four busy children. She's always looking for programs to keep her children out of trouble and bring structure into their lives, but she can't afford typical activities like dance and soccer. Thankfully, two of Loretta's children, 12-year-old Amiya and 8-year-old Amoy, have had the chance to attend the Kennedy House After School Program at Storefront in Scarborough for the past two years. Loretta loves the staff running the program and is so pleased that they are willing to take time to spend with her kids.

"This program is very helpful," says Loretta. "It gives my children an outlet and lets them be active with their friends. It also gives me a bit of relief and some time to prepare dinner before they get home."

The girls have loved their time with Kennedy House. They know almost all the kids who attend, and have a great time taking part in the special events that are offered. First they get their homework done, and then they have fun! Amiya and Amoy love when they get to celebrate birthdays and holidays with their friends after school and plan to keep going as long as they can.

From nowhere to turn to something to learn Lexx's Story


Lexx grew up with a mom on welfare and by the time she was a young adult, she was also struggling to earn an income she could live on. She decided to pursue post-secondary education, but soon found herself declined from her program with a large student debt from her first year of school.

After travelling around for a while and then staying on her grandmother's couch for a short time, Lexx arrived in Toronto with nowhere to go and only a small amount of money to survive on.

Once at Kennedy House, Lexx learned to trust our staff and enjoyed having a safe, healing place to sleep each night. Our staff gave her some realistic feedback and guidance on her financial situation—she was in a lot of debt—and she soon realized that she wasn't quite ready to transfer into her own housing. Fortunately though, that would change after months of hard work.

With the support of Kennedy House, Lexx was able to find and keep a job that allowed her to complete her schooling. She saved a bit of money and eventually received a transitional housing grant that allowed her to pay the first and last month's rent on her own apartment. She's now living on her own and earning enough money to support herself.

From sadly frustrated to totally integrated Clara's Story

Clara has faced many challenges in her life so far. She was in and out of care from a young age and, at school, had trouble making friends and was always getting into fights. Her grandmother, Margaret wanted to find a way to help Clara to thrive. When the option came up to attend Kennedy House Day Treatment, Nora knew she had to get her granddaughter involved.

Clara started attending our Day Treatment classroom in grade 9, about three years ago. Next year, she'll be totally integrated back into regular high school classes and soon after that, she should have all the credits she needs to graduate.

"I would do anything I can to help her," says Margaret. "Everyone at Kennedy House has really been there for her. If she has problems, they are always able to help her."

"There is always support here and always someone I can talk to when I feel down. I can take some space when I need it without questions being asked. The staff is amazing and will act funny when we need cheering up. The teacher is always around to answer my questions."


Day Treatment Program





