### A LEGACY OF CARING

Kennedy House was established in 1971 by Ed Blazo & Doug Chin, based on the initiative of a group of concerned community members with a vision for providing a new kind of care to young people. Our founders believed that better care would be provided in small, family-like residences or group homes rather than through large, impersonal institutions.

As a not-for-profit organization registered in 1972 and governed since by a volunteer Board of Directors, Kennedy House continues to benefit from the foresight of its founding members, some of whom remain involved to this day.

# SUPPORTING YOUTH FACING LANGUAGE BARRIERS

We welcomed a young female client who had recently arrived in Canada and faced homelessness due to a series of unfortunate circumstances. Despite arriving with no English language skills, our staff and the client used phone translators to communicate and identify her immediate and long-term needs and goals. Through consistent hard work, care, and determination, she has made incredible strides in a short time. She now speaks some English, travels independently, has obtained her work permit, and is starting ESL classes. With our support, she has also successfully moved into transitional housing tailored to her unique needs and experiences. Her progress highlights our commitment to supporting youth facing language barriers and promoting inclusivity.

# REUNITING SIBLINGS AND FACILITATING INDEPENDENT LIVING

Kennedy House successfully reunited two brothers who were initially placed in different shelters. Our Housing & Employment Coordinator and shelter staff worked diligently to ensure they could be together, recognizing the importance of family support. Once reunited, the primary workers and Housing & Employment Coordinator collaborated with the brothers to enhance their life and employment skills, complete housing applications, and transition them into independent housing together. This achievement underscores our dedication to fostering a supportive and inclusive environment that prioritizes family connections and holistic support.

These key achievements reflect Kennedy House's unwavering commitment to diversity and inclusion, demonstrating how personalized support and inclusive practices can empower youth to overcome challenges and achieve their goals. 
